## MINUTES OF THE 29th ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 21st FEBRUARY 2017 AT NORMANDY VILLAGE HALL

1. The Chairman Christopher Pettitt welcomed 36 members to the meeting.
2. The required number of Members (25) were present to form a quorum.
3. Apologies were received from Ros Clements, Jim & Audrey Chisnall.
4. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING – CONSTITUTIONAL REQUIREMENTS
  - a) Minutes for the 2016 AGM adopted.
  - b) The Chairman submitted the Secretary's Annual Report previously circulated to Members.
  - c) The Treasurer John Squier had prepared a Financial Statement for the year ending 2016 and previously circulated to Members. Current account £2,047.07 Savings (Publication) account £41.94 Financial position at 31st December 2016 is £2,089.72
  - d) The Membership Secretary reported that in 2014 Membership was 67 Individuals.
  - e) The Calendar of Events and Speakers for 2017 was presented to members.
  - f) It was agreed that the Annual Subscription rates for 2017 would remain unchanged.

## Secretary's Report 2017

Our membership remains steady and our meetings are well attended, however we are trying to recruit new members with advertising. Sandra wrote an article for the Villager which was published in May and we now have a regular “spot” advertising the open meetings with the next three months speakers and their subjects.

We started the year with Mike Hughes giving a talk after the AGM on the “Merchant Navy Under Fire”. Mike spoke about the dangers the Merchant Navy faced with the various conflicts in the World which have occurred since the end of WW2 and are still happening today.

In March David Swabey spoke about “Jacob Sheep of Normandy and Beyond”. This was very informative covering the various breeds of sheep in Great Britain with lots of pictures and the type of habitat they were best suited. He also showed the difference fleeces from each breed

The speaker originally booked to talk to us at our April Meeting had unfortunately died, so we were grateful to Peter and Brian Garbett of Normandy Motor cycles coming to talk about the how the “old bakery” was transformed into the Normandy Motor cycle shop. They showed the various models of motorbikes and how they have evolved into the machines of today.

The May meeting saw the return of local historian Murray Rowlands talking about Sir Harold Gillies. Sir Harold was a pioneer of plastic surgery who worked at the Cambridge Military Hospital treating the injured soldiers of WW1.

For our outing in June we visited the Puttenham Hop Fields. Bill Biddell told us about the hops which were growing in Puttenham and explained about the different types of hop plants. We then went to the processing plant where the hops are taken after picking. This process used to be carried out near to the hop fields, but now a new larger building containing a “leviathan picker machine” and, instead of the traditional oast house for drying, a “state of the Art” system of dryers were being installed. It was a totally fascinating trip and, I think, enjoyed by us all.

The Historians put on an exhibition for the Normandy Village fete on August 28<sup>th</sup>. The theme of exhibition was “A Century of Women in War”. It demonstrated how in WW1 women went from being mainly concerned with looking after the home to driving buses, nursing on the front line, working in and making ammunition factories and much more. In fact there were very few jobs that these pioneering women could not do. WW2 saw women once again being recruited to replace the gaps left by the men who were away

fighting in France. Although since WW1 more women were employed in a variety of jobs it was unusual for women to work outside the home except as servants before the outbreak of WW1. We were lucky to have the account by Doreen Halton who worked on Manor Fruit Farm as a “Land Girl”. Doreen at 90 years old, unfortunately couldn’t come to see the exhibition, but many of her family came to see her “Exhibits” It was difficult to visualise how the farm and fields she worked on now form our Village Hall, Bowles Club, Archery Club and Doctors surgery. The Therapy Garden is perhaps a reminder that this area grew a lot of the food stuffs we needed in the War . She lived in Normandy for many years after the War in one of the houses next to Glaziers Lane Surgery.

After the summer break our September meeting saw the return of two of our popular local speakers, David Rose and Geoff Burch. They gave a talk about local photographer Dave Salmon. It was amazing the changes which have taken place in and around Guildford. As well as local views Dave also took photos of steam engines and the local football club.

In September we had an extra visit to Ash Museum, cemetery and St Peter's Church on the Heritage Open Days weekend (about 12 people attended.)

October Peter Durrant spoke on the History and Humour of Fleet Street. He told us about how the area developed into becoming the “Hub of the Newspaper Industry” although now no newspapers are printed in Fleet Street, the British Press is always referred to as “Fleet Street”

November we were once again let down by our booked speaker. Fortunately Susan Howe was able to come and give us an amusing account of “History, Minus the Boring Bits”. Susan is a “Blue Badge Guide” and has gained an extensive knowledge of quirky historical facts.

The year ends, as usual, with our Christmas Social. Peter Southwell entertained us with a “shortened Quiz” and you, the members provided a veritable feast to get us all in the mood for Christmas.

I have, hopefully, got a full programme of speakers for the .coming year talking on a wide variety of topics, which you will find on page of the agenda.

As I shall not be standing for re-election as secretary, I would like to thank all members of the Committee who have greatly helped me in the smooth running of the Normandy Historians and you the members who support us by attending our open meetings. A special thank you goes to Ashley Hoare who keeps the Historians website up-to-date and helps me with my very limited IT knowledge.

### **Henley Park in Surrey The History of a Royal Manor**

Henley Park in Surrey Henley Park's long history spans over a thousand years from Saxon settlement through royal ownership and more than one stately mansion to a wartime factory and its last-minute rescue from ruin and collapse. New research has revealed the much-debated location of the medieval royal complex as well as a long-forgotten Jacobean-style mansion that predates the Georgian-style mansion that we know today. John is an amateur historian who has lived in Normandy for 38 years and was a founder member of Normandy Historians. He has spent many years researching Henley Park since he discovered that his house was briefly part of its extensive estates.

An updated history of Henley Park has long been overdue and with nearly 200 pages of text and 123 illustrations, many in colour, we believe that this is a book worthy of the long and fascinating history of Normandy's most prestigious estate.

Jack Kinder, the author demonstrates a unique and succinct style of writing, which coupled with his skill as a draughtsman, so ably demonstrated in the copious figures in the book, will not disappoint the reader.

Notwithstanding the excellence of his work, *A History of Normandy Park in Surrey* is a veritable tome of reference for family history researchers and for those who have an interest in the transformation and development of a village as its large fruit farms and nurseries disappeared from the rural scene in the late 19th and early 20th Centuries.


